




Joseph L. Andrews Award Celebrates Achievements In Legal Literature

Introduction to Law Librarianship and Bremer-Kovacs Collection: Historic Documents Related to the Administrative Procedure Act of 1946 receive the 2022 Joseph L. Andrews Legal Literature Award.

he AALL Awards Committee is pleased to present the 2022 Joseph L. Andrews Legal Literature Award to Zanada Joyner and Cas Laskowski, co-editors of Introduction to Law Librarianship; and Emily S. Bremer, Kathryn E. Kovacs, and Charlotte D. Schneider, co-editors of the Bremer-Kovacs Collection: Historic Documents Related to the Administrative Procedure Act of 1946. The award was established in 1967 in honor of Joseph L. Andrews and recognizes authors whose publications have made a significant textual contribution in legal literature.

Introduction to Law Librarianship is a fascinating new contribution to the literature of law librarianship education. Written by a large group of younger law librarians, the book provides prospective law librarians with a modern look into the profession from new perspectives. One of the most significant features of the book is that it has been published as an open source textbook on Pressbooks.com, and it is therefore free to students and can also be easily updated and expanded as desired, making it an ideal textbook for modern times. The book has already been adopted by three library schools with references to its well-written exploration of contemporary topics.

ZANADA JOYNER



Zanada Joyner is senior reference librarian at North Carolina Central University (NCCU) School of Law Library. She began her career in law libraries in 2013 at Loyola University New Orleans, and later moved to the University of Georgia, before joining the staff at NCCU. She has served on several AALL committees and special interest sections (SISs). Joyner was also the 2017 recipient of the Minority Leadership Development Award.



CAS LASKOWSKI

Cas Laskowski is head of research, data & instruction at the University of Arizona College of Law Library. She began her career in 2016 at Duke University Law Library before moving to Arizona. She has been involved in many SISs over the years and was treasurer of the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries. In addition, she is the incoming vice chair of the Conference of Newer Law Librarians Committee.

The Bremer-Kovacs Collection: Historic Documents Related to the Administrative Procedure Act of 1946 represents a significant innovation in the world of legal bibliography. The *Collection* is an online,



interactive research tool that is much more than a pathfinder or bibliography, although in many ways it is a thorough one of each. While not quite comprehensive, the title provides multiple routes to accessing the most important documents in the history of the Administrative Procedures Act (APA). There is an exhaustive bibliography of many of the documents that comprise the legislative history of the Act, and the book's interactive timeline feature provides a novel method for providing access to the materials. HeinOnline, too, is to be congratulated for facilitating such an interesting research tool. Combining the bibliography and the interactive timeline provides researchers with a variety of ways to explore the history of the 1946 APA.

EMILY S. BREMER

Emily S. Bremer is an associate professor of law at Notre Dame Law School. She earned her law degree from New York University Law School and clerked for the Honorable Andrew J.
