1. Proximity Searching

Use proximity searching in any HeinOnline database to find specific words you wish to find in a given proximity to one another. To conduct a proximity search, use the tilde symbol, ~, at the end of a phrase. For example, use the **Full Text** tab in the Law Journal Library and search for "net neutrality regulation"~10.

2. Searching in the Federal Register



If you are searching for a change that was made on a specific day in the Federal Register, but you're not sure where the change would have fallen, you can conduct a search using the date. For example, use the advanced search box:

This search will return results in the Federal Register from March 4, 1975 that have both "federal railroad administration" and "appendix d" in the text.

3. Cumulative Contents

Legislative histories found in HeinOnline's U.S. Federal Legislative History Library are comprised of a number of documents ranging from one or two to hundreds, which can be overwhelming to browse through. When clicking on the publication title of a legislative history, users have the ability to view the Cumulative Contents. This allows users to browse and scroll through all documents in all volumes.



Policymakers are in the midst of an active debate over how best to accelerate the build-out of next-generation broadband networks. The U.S. economy has a significant economic stake in the outcome. It is increasingly apparent in the global economy linked together by the Internet that the future competitiveness of individual firms, and indeed entire economies, depends heavily on state-of-the-art networks. Next-generation broadband networks will be significantly more expensive than earlier versions. In the U.S. alone, the required investment to deploy such networks adequately could exceed \$140 billion. In virtually all private-sector markets, firms that undertake investments have sufficient freedom to fashion the way in which they offer the products and services those investments make possible, and to price them in ways that meet demands and optimize returns. In the broadband Internet access market, however, advocates of proposed network neutrality ("net neutrality") regulation would curtail those

INTRODUCTION

Over the last two decades, women have organized against the almost routine violence that shapes their lives.¹ Drawing from the strength of shared experience, women have recognized that the political demands of millions speak more powerfully than the pleas of a few isolated voices. This politicization in turn has transformed the way we understand violence against women. For example, battering and rape, once seen as private (family matters) and aberrational (errant sexual aggression), are now largely recognized as part of a broad-scale system of domination that affects women as

7. Searching by Topic


