Nearly 900 titles, more than 1.4 million pages, and the only complete coverage of the official U.S. Reports from 1754-current.

The United States Supreme Court is the highest tribunal in the nation for all cases and controversies arising under the Constitution of the United States. The Court stands as the final arbiter of the law and guardian of constitutional liberties. The most prominent landmark cases are decided by the U.S. Supreme Court and have a significant impact on our society at large. For easy access, users can view a list of the most commonly researched U.S. Supreme Court landmark cases on the welcome page of HeinOnline's database.

The official U.S. Reports are an indexed compilation of the official full-text of all decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States, and the official record of its rulings, orders, case tables, and other proceedings. These bound volumes contain the 4th and final generation of the Court's opinions after the bench opinions, slip opinions, and preliminary prints.

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Full text of *U.S. Reports* with Tools

(1) **Cite:** Displays citation information in several formats which can be copied/pasted or exported.

(2) **ScholarCheck:** Hein's ScholarCheck is a series of tools and features integrated throughout HeinOnline which allow users to view journal articles that heavily influence the case or subject being researched.

- **Cited by Articles:** displays the number of articles which cite the case or article being viewed
- **Cited by Cases:** displays the number of cases which cite the case or article being viewed
- **Cited by ALL:** displays the number of materials cited from within the American Law Institute Library
- **Accessed Times:** displays the number of times accessed by HeinOnline users in a rolling 12-month period

(3) **Oyez:** linking to Oyez, a free law project at Chicago-Kent providing a complete and authoritative source for all of the Supreme Court's audio since the installation of a recording system in 1955, is available for Supreme Court cases via HeinOnline. Oyez offers transcript-synchronized and searchable audio, case summaries, illustrated decision information, and opinions.



Case Law Coverage with Fastcase:

The federal case coverage includes the judicial opinions of the Supreme Court (1754-present), Federal Circuits (1924-present), Board of Tax Appeals (vols. 1-47), Tax Court Memorandum Decisions (vols. 1-59), U.S. Customs Court (vols. 1-70), Board of Immigration Appeals (1996-present), Federal District Courts (1924-present), and Federal Bankruptcy Courts (1 B.R. 1-present). The state case law covers all fifty states, with nearly half of the states dating back to the 1800s. Coverage for the remaining states dates back to approximately 1950.

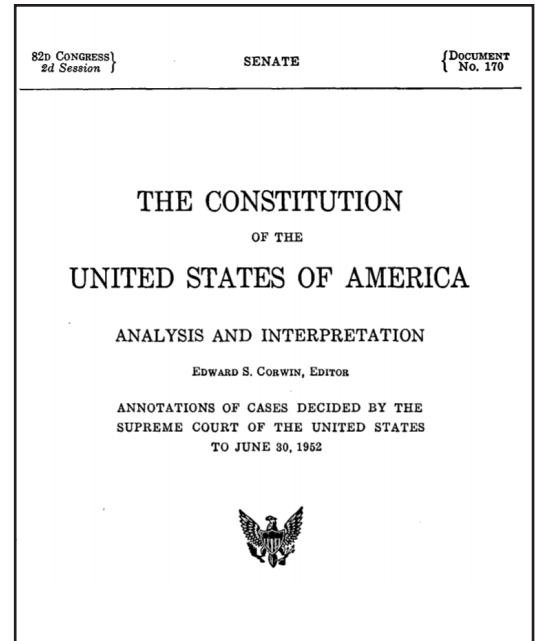
RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

This compilation of separately published pamphlets of the *Rules of the Supreme Court of the United States* includes one copy of every pamphlet in the Library of the U.S. Supreme Court. No bibliography including all separately published Rules pamphlets has been located. Thus, this compilation is probably not complete, especially for the early years.

A bibliography of the forty-two pamphlets scanned follows. Please note that the Supreme Court rarely publishes a "new edition" of the Rules if only one or two rule changes are made. Typically, the Supreme Court would issue a rule change in an order which would then be slipped into the most recent pamphlet available. Therefore, the scholar or historian who is trying to trace a particular rule will be wise to use the pamphlets filmed here along with the attached list of all rule changes as published in *United States Reports*.
